Course II – Modern Trends in Statistics

Unit 1. Mathematical Techniques for Statistics: Review of sequences and series, Convergence, Continuity, Uniform continuity, Differentiability, Laplace Transform, Vector spaces, Independence of vectors, Basis of a vector space. Different type of matrices, Different type of quadratic forms and their properties, Eigen-values and Eigen-vectors, Spectral decomposition of matrices, Linear transformations.

Unit 2. Probability and Limit Theorems: Probability Space, Bayes' theorem, Random variables and distribution function, Standard continuous and discrete distributions and their inter-relationships. Characteristic functions and their properties, Sequences of random variables and various types of convergences, Laws of large numbers, Central limit theorems and applications.

Unit 3. Statistical Inference: Properties of estimates, Sufficiency, Minimal sufficiency and completeness, Minimum variance bound estimator, Rao-Blackwell and Lehmann-Scheffe theorems, Moment estimation, Maximum likelihood estimation of parameters, Neyman- Pearson theory of testing of hypotheses, Uniformly most powerful test, Unbiased test, Construction of UMPU test.

Unit 4. Multivariate Analysis: Important properties of multivariate normal and multinomial distributions. Maximum likelihood estimation, Hotelling's T^2 statistic (one sample and two samples) and applications. Data reduction methods. Principal Component analysis, Canonical correlation and Discriminant analysis.
